SOUTHPORT U₃A – A SEVEN YEAR PERSPECTIVE

learn, laugh, live

I was approached by the Southport u3a Chair – Brenda Jones, and asked if I would like to take over the Membership Secretary role from Brian Tyler, who was due to retire. I agreed.... Little did I know!!!!

The membership (1100) was held as an Excel spreadsheet on Brian's computer and the whole membership process was based around Brian's excellent computer skills.

My first shock was arriving at Brian's house with my wife, Yvonne, to be welcomed by a huge pile of envelopes sent in for renewal. At that time all correspondence was by letter and all payment was by cash or cheques. An enormous amount of

administration. So, the four of us (with Brian's wife Jenny) spent hours handling all this mail on quite a few afternoons.

An average monthly meeting took 25-30 new members with all the administration that went along with it and each month a further 10+ would come by mail. All handled manually.

At about the same time, the Government was introducing GDPR rules to protect the dissemination of people's personal data. We were wide open!!! Our membership information was sitting on Brian's home computer with no automated way of backing it up. Because it was all on Excel, each of the Group Leaders kept a list of their members on their own personal computers. So, people's personal info was spread all over Southport! And there was no link between GLs and Brian's computer. As a Committee, we had no idea who was in each group. Something had to change!!

We decided to transfer to the Beacon system. This had been designed by u3a volunteers and was used by many u3as already. After the transfer, our membership was now held in one central place and GL's could only access their members through the system. It meant that GLs could use the system to manage their groups, to record money ready for banking. It also meant that we had a record of which members were in which group. And we were able to use the system to introduce online renewals each year. By the time we finished with Beacon we were over 50% of our membership renewing online. But it was rather clunky, and the software was old - and there were worries that the u3a would not continue supporting it.

So, two years ago we transferred to the Simple Membership System. This allowed us not only to *renew* online but also to take *new* members online. It also gave GL's much more control over the management of their groups. When they were running events, members could book directly. Other events could also be booked by members online. And in all cases members were able to pay by PayPal online. They could manage waiting lists when full. It also meant if a waiting list got too long we could start another group.

As we handle the renewals this year, I am fully expecting that 70-80% will renew online. I am handling less that 10% of new members manually, with the rest applying and paying online.

So, in seven years, the whole management of our u3a Membership has changed enormously. As has the actual membership which is now over 1800. Had we not used the opportunity to introduce all this technology I would be swamped by a mountain of paperwork.

And this has been reflected in the whole way that the u3a has changed with the times over this same period. When I first started, 25% of 1100 members did not have the internet. Now, less than 5% of the 1800 have no internet access. Our members are enjoying unprecedented enlargement of group activities and events all of which can be accessed and paid for very easily. And this is supported by the combination of website, daily news, newsletters and magazines which are being produced to keep our members up to date with all the things that are happening. We are now a much more streamlined and modern organisation able to offer a terrific range of opportunities to our members.

I have been proud to be part of this enormous development of our u3a here in Southport and now I am able to hand over to Roger Haigh and Anne Rushton who are taking aver the baton. My thanks go to all our members for all the help and support they have given me over the years.




